

Army Apology Sent Air Force At Maneuvers

NERNBERG, Germany, Sept. 13 (UP).—The American Army apologized Tuesday to the Air Force. The apology ended a brief dispute over Air Force victory claims during United States maneuvers in Eastern Germany.

The dispute between the two American branches arose when Brig. Gen. Philip E. Gallagher challenged the Air Force's claim to have "wiped out" the United States constabulary which has been playing the part of the "enemy" in the make-believe warfare that started a week ago.

Brig. Gen. Charles F. Born, in one phase of the dispute, had threatened to take his planes and go home from the maneuvers.

Tuesday, however, the army admitted that the Air Force was correct and Gallagher apologized for inability of his ground-forces umpire to assess properly the sudden air strikes by jet-propelled F-80 Shooting Stars and propeller-driven Thunderbolts.
